Engaging Russia on tactical nuclear weapons: Next steps on confidence building

A roundtable jointly organized by the Arms Control Association (ACA), the British American Security Information Council (BASIC), the Friedrich Ebert Foundation and the Institute for Peace Research and Security Policy at the University of Hamburg (IFSH).

In February 2013, NATO members agreed on the mandate of the new "Special Advisory and Consultative Arms Control, Disarmament and Non-Proliferation Committee". The decision results from an agreement reached at the May 2012 Chicago summit in the context of the Deterrence and Defense Posture Review. It paves the way for Allies to discuss possible measures to build confidence and increase transparency on tactical nuclear weapons. Such a process would be a crucial step towards inclusion of tactical nuclear weapons in a future arms control accord.

A clear view on what NATO expects from a nuclear confidence-building process and how the Alliance wants to achieve those goals will be conducive toward future engagement of Russia. What does the concept of reciprocity entail in practice? On what issues should the Alliance initially engage Russia? Is confidence-building best pursued on a step-by-step basis or is a comprehensive package on possible transparency measures more promising? Should nuclear confidence-building be linked to progress on other issues on the NATO-Russia agenda?

The seminar will provide an opportunity for diplomats, officials and experts from NATO countries and NATO headquarters to discuss these and other questions in a closed-door setting. The goal is to discuss the benefits and shortcomings of different confidence-building approaches, with a view to fostering a constructive dialogue with Russia on tactical nuclear weapons.

The seminar will first address general questions such as the role of NATO's new arms control committee and the requirement for Russian reciprocity. It will then turn towards specific confidence-building proposals and discuss possible linkages to other issues. The different topics will be introduced briefly by experts or officials. The seminar will help prepare a May 16 event in Moscow on similar issues.

The event will be by invitation only and will take place under Chatham House rules.
